Mayor's message

Every ten years, as a Nation and the territories under United States authority, it is mandated by the Constitution to count every person. This is known as a Census. It has been the process since 1790 that every ten years we undertake this Census count. Needless to say, it is a bigger task each time than it was the time before.

What does the U.S. Census Bureau do with this information and why count people at all? The data collected helps the Nations leaders to make vital decisions on our behalf. Decisions like reapportionment and redistricting and how to fairly distribute more than \$300 billion in federal funds to tribal, state, and local governments each year. Programs like Head Start, WIC, road construction and rehabilitation, public transportation, programs for the elderly, scientific research, planning for school projects, business environments and growth are all affected as a result of having this census information.

It is important to get the correct information for fair representation. The results for Utah may give us another seat in the House of Representatives. Population has a direct relationship with that number whereas the U.S. Senate is composed of only two Senators from each state.

Census Day is April 1st 2010 (yea I know its Fools Day). Between now and then, you will be reminded and invited to be prepared for

that day. The 2010 Census will be short form only--just 10 easy questions.

We have been informed that the Census workers will use handheld computers with Global Positioning System to check our address list in 2009 (April thru July). In preparation for that event, all of the addresses in Elk Ridge have been sent (in 2008) to the Census Bureau as they relate to the standard of addressing used here as well as nation wide. All of the address and road name changes from two and a half years ago, are in the Census records and will be part of the information that these workers will be checking and relying on.

The Census Bureau protects and keeps this information confidential. No court of law, not even the President of the United States, can access your individual responses. Census workers must pass security and employment reference checks and are highly motivated to protect your answers. All Census Bureau employees are subject to a \$250 thousand dollar fine and/or a 5-year prison term for disclosing any information that could identify a respondent or household.

We will keep you informed and updated on any events or information that comes to this office.

PLANNING COMMISSIONERS NEEDED

We presently have two positions to fill on the Planning Commission. This is a volunteer service position and it requires a two night a month commitment to serve. The City requires you to attend an overnight certification training that we pay for.

FROM THE EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER HOW I SEE IT

HEADS UP!! April is emergency drill month. This drill will help each and every one prepare for the emergency which will be upon us. The drill will begin at 9:00 a.m. with the sounding of the city siren; the sheriff's office will also use their automated phone calling system beginning at 8:30 to alert all citizens of the drill. Each of you should use the packet with the colored sheets and post the color in your front window or on the front door to indicate the status of your household with regard to injuries. Your block captain will take note of the indicators and report back to your neighborhood chairman regarding status, and if required CERT personnel will respond.

This is also an excellent opportunity for you to test your supply of food, water and emergency items. I highly recommend you try living off your storage for a week. If you cannot do it for a week, try three days. This will, for most people, issue a "wake up call" and give you an idea where you are deficient in your preparation. It is better to learn now where you are lacking than when the need arises, for then it will be too late; food supplies in the grocery stores will be depleted in just a few days.

These supplies should also include soap, toilet paper, paper towels, tooth paste, cooking oil and some sweet treats and games.

Water is of primary importance for many have dehydrated foods and without water, they are of course, useless.

Water seems to be the least element of concern, but it should be the most as we cannot live without it. We need it for bodily cleanliness, cleaning wounds, etc.

Another issue is emergency supplies such as first aid kits, healing herbs, isopropyl alcohol for cleaning wounds, splint material to care for broken limbs, bandaging materials, etc.; an alternate heat source such as kerosene heaters is advisable; obtain alternate cooking methods such as BBQ, propane and/or butane stoves; and you might think about acquiring an old fashioned washboard.

These are some of the things you might think about which will help you when the emergency arrives. In case you missed last month's newsletter where brother Moravec's e-mail address was listed, here it is again: moraveckennethb@aol.com. You can request his list of disaster preparedness items including storage items as well as how to prepare for a disaster, which I find most helpful. This list is included in his seminars.

Don't Chance Your Luck

Many of us consider ourselves to be lucky, some of us not so much. But when it comes to health and safety, who wants to rely on luck alone? With our town growing there have been many changes to the street addresses and names. These changes that have corrected previous problems and have helped emergency services avoid responding to the wrong address and location. We are fortunate to have the advanced 9-1-1 system that will recognize the land-line number you call from and automatically provide the dispatcher with your name, address and phone number, but this information is not much help if the responders cannot locate the address because of mislabeled houses or mail boxes. In a life threatening situation, seconds and minutes count, and those minutes are better spent helping those who are hurt or ill rather than wandering the street looking for the appropriate house. All our city emergency services encourage everyone to look at your house number, mailbox, and/or street markings to make sure they are consistent with the ones recorded on the City Plan, and that they are clearly visible from the street both in the day time and at night. There have already been address issues with 9-1-1 calls that could have turned out worse because of the address on the

home not corresponding to the city response map. Don't let your home be the next problem.

Other things you can do to aid rescuers is to have an extra person, if available watch for the responders, turn on or flash a porch light at night, or have someone outside acknowledging the correct residence. These actions cut precious minutes off any response. First aid courses are also available to help everyone be aware of what is going on around you and be able to provide key information of the problem aiding our EMTs to do their work.

Each home owners insurance depends on our emergency services to do the best they can as quickly as possible; please do your part to help us ours better.
