REGULAR MEETING
TOWN OF GRAND LAKE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
MONDAY, JUNE 27, 2011 7:30 P.M.

CALL TO ORDER: The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees was called to order by Mayor Judy Burke at 7:36 p.m. at the Town Hall, 1026 Park Avenue.

ROLL CALL

PRESENT: Mayor Burke; Mayor Pro-Tem Peterson; Trustees Johnson, Lanzi, Lewis, Ludwig, and Weydert; Town Manager Hale and Town Clerk Kolinske.

ABSENT: None.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

June 13, 2011: Not available.

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

Mayor Burke announced that it would be appreciated if cell phones were turned off during the meeting.

Mayor Burke announced that the Rocky Mountain Repertory Theatre is now presenting its second production of the 2011 season, "*Guys and Dolls*".

Mayor Burke announced that the 4th of July Weekend Celebration will include a bake sale, pancake breakfast and a fireworks display over Grand Lake at dark.

Mayor Burke announced that antique and classic wooden boats will be on display July 9th on Grand Lake at the Town's docks.

Mayor Burke then announced that the 25th Annual Independent Sports Club Invitational Golf Tournament will be held Saturday, July 9th at the Grand Lake Golf Course.

PRESENTATIONS:

GRAND COUNTY COMMISSIONERS - Mayor Burke welcomed Grand County Commissioners; Gary Bumgarner, James Newberry, and Nancy Stuart. Nancy Stuart, the Commissioner representing Grand Lake's District, gave a presentation, "Enhancements (Not Mitigation) Offered if Moffat Project Approved" (see attached Exhibit A). Commissioners Gary Bumgarner and James Newberry then joined in on discussion of water issues. In conclusion, Gary Bumgarner briefly talked about the re-districting areas for the Grand County Commissioners and said that there was a meeting scheduled to discuss the matter.

Having no further comments, Mayor Burke thanked the Commissioners for their time and for coming to this evening's meeting.

CONFLICTS OF INTEREST:

Mayor Burke stated that if there are any Trustees wishing to announce a conflict of interest with any items on this evening's agenda, they should do so at this time.

Trustee Ludwig announced that he had a conflict with the Local Liquor Licensing issues as he holds a license for The Rapids Lodge and Restaurant.

Trustee Johnson announced that he had a conflict with consideration of a new Hotel and Restaurant Liquor License for Mama Bear's, LLC, d/b/a Mama Bear's because the applicant is his wife.

Both Trustee Lewis and Trustee Peterson announced that they had a conflict with consideration to set a Show Cause Hearing regarding the Temporary Transfer Permit issued to Grumpy's Saloon, Inc., d/b/a Grumpy's Saloon because they work for the family of the owner of Grumpy's.

REPORTS: SALES TAX CASH FLOW REPORT FOR JUNE, 2011:

Mayor Burke asked Town Clerk Kolinske to present the sales tax cash flow report. Kolinske reported that the amount of revenue received in June for the month of April is \$22,210. This amount is 6.34% above what was received through June 2010.

REPORTS: FINANCIAL REPORT FOR MAY 2011:

Mayor Burke asked Financial Trustee Peterson to present the Financial Report for May 2011. Peterson reported that General Fund expenditures through the end of May totaled \$405,802.79 or 27.7% of budget. He said the Water Fund expenditures for the same period totaled \$144,414.52 or 29.4% of budget, the Marina Fund expenditures totaled \$45,249.71 or 13.6% of budget and the PAYT Fund expenditures totaled \$1,025.00 or 16.0% of budget.

At 8:35 p.m. Trustee Ludwig excused himself and left the room.

LIQUOR LICENSING AUTHORITY: CONSIDERATION OF APPROVAL OF SPECIAL EVENTS LIQUOR PERMIT APPLICATIONS FROM THE GRAND LAKE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE FOR "BUFFALO BARBECUE" AND "CREWS AND BREWS" FUNDRAISING EVENTS - Mayor Burke asked Town Clerk Kolinske to present this matter to the Board. Kolinske stated that this request was for Buffalo Barbecue to be held July 16 & 17, 2011 at Lakefront Park and August 27, 2011 for a Crews and Brews Fest to be held in Town Square. She said that the application documents were in order and the appropriate

state fees were paid. Public notices were posted on the premises on June 16, 2011. The Grand County Sheriff's Department reviewed the application and responded with one incident July 16, 2010 regarding Karen Wood, the owner of Grand Lake Brewing Company. She stated that the Board must investigate the applications and must deny the permits if:

- * its issuance would injure the public welfare by reason of the nature or location of the special event, or failure of the applicant to conduct past special events in compliance with applicable laws and regulations; or
- * the organization fails to show that other existing facilities are not available or are inadequate for the needs of the organization, and that the organization is temporarily occupying premises and that the general public will be served during the special event.

Kolinske noted that Lisa Jenkins, Executive Director for the Chamber, was present.

Lisa Jenkins was recognized from the audience and said that Karen Wood will not be involved with Buffalo Barbecue but may be a participant in the Crews and Brews Fest. Jenkins said that they have strict guidelines for all brewers to comply with and gave a copy to the Town Clerk.

Following discussion, Trustee Lewis moved to approve the Special Events Liquor Permits for the Grand Lake Chamber of Commerce for "Buffalo Barbecue" and "Crews and Brews" fundraising events. Trustee Lanzi seconded the motion and all Trustees voted aye.

At 8:45 p.m. Trustee Johnson excused himself and left the room.

LIQUOR LICENSING AUTHORITY: PUBLIC HEARING – CONSIDERATION OF A NEW HOTEL AND RESTAURANT LIQUOR LICENSE FOR MAMA BEAR'S, LLC, D/B/A MAMA BEAR'S – Mayor Burke opened the Public Hearing and asked Town Clerk Kolinske to present this matter to the Board. Kolinske explained that an application for a new Hotel and Restaurant Liquor License has been received, with the appropriate fees, evidence of possession, and floor diagram, from Mama Bear's, LLC, d/b/a Mama Bear's. The location is the former Bear's Den at 612 Grand Avenue. The property is zoned Commercial. The location is more than 500 feet from any educational institution, and no license has been denied for this location in the last two years for the reason that the reasonable requirements of the neighborhood and the desires of the adult inhabitants were satisfied by the existing outlets; therefore, state statute does not prohibit liquor from being sold from this location. On June 13th, the Local Liquor Licensing Authority, Board of Trustees, received this application and scheduled a Public Hearing for consideration of this application for 7:30 p.m. June 27th, which is more than 30 days from the date of the

application. Public notice of the Public Hearing was posted on the premises on June 16, 2011 and Legal Notice No. 6658761 of this Public Hearing was published in the Sky-Hi News. The notice provided the type of license applied for, the name and address of the applicant, the date of the application, and the date of the hearing. A petition was received containing 29 signatures. Kolinske said that she was able to verify that 18 of the people that signed are Grand Lake residents. The Grand County Sheriff's Department reviewed their files and found no adverse information that would affect the issuance of the license. At this Public Hearing, the Board must make a specific finding of fact from evidence adduced at this hearing regarding the desires of the adult inhabitants of the Town, and it must deny the application if it finds the sale of liquor at such a location is contrary to those desires. The local licensing authority has authority to refuse to issue this license for good cause, as defined in 12-47-103. The applicant is required to establish the reasonable requirements of the neighborhood or the desires of its adult inhabitants. The hearing is to be conducted as a quasi-judicial proceeding and in a manner which assures all interested parties a fair and reasonable opportunity to present views and information, and such that the applicant's procedural rights of fundamental fairness be protected. The Board must consider the moral character of the applicant; the reasonable requirements of the neighborhood; the desires of the adult inhabitants of the neighborhood; the number, type and availability of liquor outlets located in or near the neighborhood; and other reasonable restrictions which are or may be placed on the neighborhood by the Local Licensing Authority, Board of Trustees. The Board may not consider any information presented after the close of the Public Hearing. It must make a determination either approving or denying the license, and state the reasons for that decision, within 30 days of the close of the Public Hearing.

Having no comments from the audience, Mayor Burke closed the Public Hearing and turned the matter over to the Board of Trustees.

Following brief discussion, Trustee Peterson moved to approve a new Hotel and Restaurant Liquor License for Mama Bear's, LLC, d/b/a Mama Bear's. Trustee Lewis seconded the motion and all Trustees voted aye.

At 8:53 p.m. Trustee Johnson resumed his seat and Trustees Lewis and Peterson excused themselves and left the room.

LIQUOR LICENSING AUTHORITY: CONSIDERATION TO SET A SHOW CAUSE HEARING REGARDING THE TEMPORARY TRANSFER PERMIT ISSUED TO GRUMPY'S SALOON, INC., D/B/A GRUMPY'S SALOON – Mayor Burke asked Town Clerk Kolinske to present this matter to the Board. Kolinske reported that on April 4, 2011, she issued a Temporary Transfer Permit to Grumpy's Saloon, Inc., d/b/a Grumpy's Saloon. Grumpy's Saloon was closed the entire month of April and did not open until May 4th. She said that she was recently

notified by the Sheriff's office of an incident that occurred on June 11, 2011 at Grumpy's. In addition, staff has been advised of incidents occurring on May 8, May 28 and June 16 that suggest over serving of alcohol may be occurring. At its meeting on Monday, June 27, 2011, the Board of Trustees, acting as the Local Liquor Licensing Authority, will need to decide whether to set this matter for a hearing to determine whether Grumpy's liquor license should be suspended or revoked.

The Board can take one of three actions:

1. The Board can set this matter for a Show Cause Hearing to be held on July 25, 2011, to determine whether the license should be suspended or revoked.
2. The Board can decide to not have a Show Cause Hearing.
3. The Board can reserve the right to review this matter at the time of consideration of the Transfer of Ownership Application. The Temporary Transfer Permit is valid for 120 days from the date of issue. Liquor Code allows the Local Liquor Licensing Authority to, in its discretion and for good cause shown, extend the permit for an additional period not to exceed sixty days.

This is a quasi-judicial matter. Therefore, other than to decide whether the nature of the alleged violations is sufficient to necessitate a Show Cause Hearing, the Board should refrain from discussing the validity or merits of the allegations or any possible penalties it may impose if it concludes the violations have occurred until the time of the Show Cause Hearing. Kolinske noted that Dustin Barnes, President/Secretary, was present.

Mayor Burke asked Mr. Barnes if he would like to speak. Rachel Terry, 604 Marina Drive, was recognized by the Chair. She said that she and Dustin now know that owning a bar is a huge effort. They are hoping that the clientele will change from what Grumpy's Cigar Bar used to service with a fresher crowd and hopefully fewer problems. She said that they do understand that there have been a few incidents that have occurred but she and Dustin wanted to give the Board some assurance that they are making their highest effort possible to prevent any future occurrences. All of their bartenders and bouncers are now TIPS certified. She said that they have talked with each employee individually about policies and procedures following a meeting they had with Sheriff Johnson, Lt. Grinstead, Town Clerk Kolinske and Code Enforcement Officer Korkowski. Some of the changes that were made are that no employee will be allowed to drink on their shift, if a patron has had too much to drink they will be marked the same as a minor so that they will not be served anymore and if a fight should occur in or outside of the

establishment they will make every effort to contact the Sheriff's Department. They also have an incident report form for employees to use. If anything should happen, the employee will use the form to write everything down so we will have a record of it. And finally, they will have the deputies do a walk through as was suggested by Sheriff Johnson and Lt. Grinstead.

Town Clerk Kolinske mentioned to the Board that Rachel Terry has an application to become the Registered Manager but as of yet she has not submitted the completed application.

Following discussion, Trustee Lanzi moved to reserve the right to review this matter at the time of consideration of the Transfer of Ownership Application. The motion failed for the lack of a second.

Trustee Johnson then moved to set this matter for a Show Cause Hearing to be held on July 25, 2011, to determine whether the license should be suspended or revoked seconded by Trustee Weydert. During discussion Rachel Terry asked if the hearing could be held on a date other than the 25th as that is her birthday. Trustee Johnson then amended his motion to set this matter for a Show Cause Hearing to be held on July 11, 2011, to determine whether the license should be suspended or revoked. Trustee Weydert seconded the amended motion and all Trustees voted aye.

At 9:07 p.m. Trustees Lewis and Peterson resumed their seats.

LIQUOR LICENSING AUTHORITY: CONSIDERATION OF THE DESIGNATION OF RELATED FACILITIES TO THE RESORT COMPLEX LIQUOR LICENSE HELD BY GRAND LAKE LODGE – Mayor Burke asked Town Clerk Kolinske to present this matter to the Board. Kolinske explained that on March 28, 2011, the Board of Trustees, Local Liquor Licensing Authority, approved the Transfer of Ownership to Grand Lake Ventures, LLC, d/b/a Grand Lake Lodge for a Hotel and Restaurant Liquor License. Following many discussions with State Liquor, the license was issued as Resort Complex with Related Facility Permit. The Lodge is now being asked to submit a Report of Changes Application and provide maps of the specific areas where alcohol will be served besides the main lodge. The three areas being designated are the pool, the Deer Deck and the Mountain Side Terrace. The consideration before the Board is the approval of the designation of related facilities to the Resort Complex Liquor License held by Grand Lake Lodge. She noted that Jeff Larson, Manager, was present.

Following brief discussion, Trustee Peterson moved to approve the designation of related facilities to the Resort Complex Liquor License held by Grand Lake Lodge. Trustee Lewis seconded the motion and all Trustees voted aye.

OLD BUSINESS:

NEW BUSINESS:

CONSIDERATION OF ADMINISTRATIVE ENFORCEMENT VERSUS CRIMINAL ENFORCEMENT – Mayor Burke asked Town Manager Hale to present this matter to the Board. Hale said that no action is being requested at this time as staff will proceed and bring a proposal before the Board at a later date.

Trustee Weydert moved to take no action at this time. Trustee Johnson seconded the motion and all Trustees voted aye.

NEW BUSINESS:

CONSIDERATION OF ORDINANCE NO. 12-2011, AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 12, ARTICLE 7: DESIGN REVIEW STANDARDS, OF THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF GRAND LAKE – Mayor Burke asked Town Manager Hale to present this matter to the Board. Hale explained that throughout 2011 the Planning Commission has made favorable recommendations of approval to the Town Board of Trustees for proposed variances to the Design Review Standards of the Municipal Code of the Town of Grand Lake. These three variances have been for a prohibited window material, vinyl windows, on two separate residential structures, as well as for consideration of an acceptable roofing material of Polyurethane Foam for a commercial flat roof. Each of those three times, the Board has opted to uphold the recommendation of the Planning Commission. In discussions, the Commission directed staff to amend the Municipal Code to reflect the desire of the Commission to allow these two materials to be considered as a part of the Acceptable Window Materials and Acceptable Roofing Materials of Municipal Code Chapter 12, Article 7: Design Review Standards. Staff has drafted an ordinance based on the Commission's direction. At their last regularly-scheduled meeting, the Commission forwarded a favorable recommendation to adopt the draft ordinance. The Board should review the draft ordinance and discuss, if desired. If the Board is favorable to allowing the proposed code modifications, the Board should move to adopt Ordinance No. 12-2011.

Trustee Peterson moved to adopt Ordinance No. 12-2011, an Ordinance Amending Chapter 12, Article 7: Design Review Standards, of the Code of the Town of Grand Lake. Trustee Peterson seconded the motion and all Trustees voted aye.

NEW BUSINESS:

CONSIDERATION TO DIRECT STAFF TO COMP UP TO \$200.00 IN TOUR RIDES FOR TRAVEL WRITERS, SUBJECT TO AVAILABILITY ON THE SPECIFIC TOUR – During the June 13th meeting, the Board expressed its willingness to comp up to \$200 per year in marina boat rides for traveling writers. As conceived, all

inquiries will first go from the Chamber Executive Director to the Marina Manager for scheduling; if he has availability on an already scheduled tour, he'll simply note on the sign up list that the ride was gratis, and the Town Treasurer will keep track of these against the \$200 budget. I'll update you as we donate these rides, and Lisa Jenkins agreed to help us keep track of any articles that come out of this practice. If we get close to the \$200 budget, staff will re-approach the Board for discussion to see if the program is working as designed and to determine if additional comps make sense. The staff recommendation is for the Board to make a motion to direct staff to comp up to \$200 in tour rides for travel writers, subject to availability on the specific tour. Hale noted that Lisa Jenkins, Executive Director for the Chamber of Commerce was present.


Jenkins said that this wouldn't be for traveling writers only but for television personalities as well. She said that Ron Stern from FOX News will be here in July to do a half an hour travel segment and she is also working with PBS. She stated that Trail Ridge Marina has agreed to join in.

During discussion, it was decided that \$100.00 would come from the General Fund and \$100.00 would come from the Marina Fund and if the budgeted amount of \$200.00 is used up quickly for this, Town Manager Hale would come back before the Board to discuss additional funds.

Following discussion, Trustee Peterson moved to direct staff to comp up to \$200 in tour rides for travel writers and television personnel, subject to availability on the specific tour. Trustee Johnson seconded the motion and all Trustees voted aye.

ADJOURNMENT: Trustee Lewis moved to adjourn, seconded by Trustee Peterson. All Trustees voted aye, and the meeting was adjourned at 9:26 p.m., June 27, 2011.

ENHANCEMENTS (NOT MITIGATION) OFFERED IF MOFFAT PROJECT APPROVED

From the beginning of the negotiations, Grand County has focused on the resource of the Fraser and Colorado River and their tributaries. The goal was to make the resource (the rivers) better than it is today and to put in place procedures that would, to the greatest extent possible, preserve and protect the resource for the future. That is what has been called enhancements.

Water

Limit ability to reduce USFS bypass flows – can only reduce when Denver goes on in-house only restrictions (never done to date) and if that makes any Grand County entity go on in-house only restrictions Denver will not reduce.

1000 af. bypass from Denver's yield to be used in Fraser River or its tributaries if available when call by Grand County (in addition to USFS bypass flows) for the environment.

Future west slope water rights development – Denver will not undertake any future water development projects or appropriations or acquisitions of water rights located in Grand County without the prior approval of the Grand County BOCC and River District.

Municipal Use of Denver's facilities – may, on case by case basis, allow water treatment plants on Fraser to convey water as a temporary source of supply, if back up supply available.

Use of unused capacity – explore, case by case, possibilities of using Denver's system to benefit Grand County or other public entities or the environment in transport of water.

Shoshone outage protocol; support for possible west slope purchase of Shoshone; support negotiation with Xcel for donation of Shoshone water right; in-stream flow when call could be on but plant is not in operation; establish an outage protocol to replicate release when power plant is down and priority.

75 af consumptive water to WPRA, Winter Park Water & Sanitation, Grand County #1, Town of Fraser, Town of Granby. (100 af to WPRA – 275 af to be decided between other entities).

Year-round delivery of Clinton By-Pass water. (currently delivered November through May)

0% water for WPRA (important for snowmaking) – allows WPRA to leverage water based on return flows

Study how Denver's rights in Hammond, Rich might be used to enhance streamflow (in addition to 1000 af).

Study how Denver's Big Lake Ditch (feeds into Williams Fork Reservoir) can remain in agricultural use while providing Denver with yield it paid for. Is there a balance? Return flows helps Reeder Creek which flows into Colorado River below Williams Fork.

Vail Ditch Shares – Allow Grand County Mutual Ditch & Reservoir Co. (Grand County, Town of Winter Park, Winter Park Water & Sanitation, Grand County #1, Town of Granby, River District) to trade shares for like amount of water in Denver's system (Meadow Creek Reservoir) for release into Fraser River basin. Denver will not oppose changes of Vail Ditch shares for this use.

Storage in Williams Fork – if portion of 1000 af made available during Shoshone call or when outage protocol in place – Denver agrees to make available for release a like amount from Williams Fork up to 1000 af for environmental flows – can carry over and increase up to 2500 af.

\$11M provided for aquatic environment, nutrient loading, projects that will provide benefits to Fraser River.

Aquatic Habitat

\$1M but for aquatic habitat (swing \$)

\$1M for aquatic habitat upon issuance and acceptance of permit by Denver for project

\$2M for future environmental enhancements (to be used in Learning by Doing)

Cooperative Effort for Aquatic Environment –IGA for Learning by Doing to protect, restore, and when possible enhance aquatic environment in the Upper Colorado, Fraser, and Williams Fork River basins. Request that Corps of Engineers acknowledge Learning by Doing IGA in Record of Decision. This will bind Denver to forever stay engaged and participatory in dealing with issues in Grand County.

Nutrient Loading

\$2M to reduce nutrient loading if Denver is required to mitigate (could be directed to a wastewater plant). Wastewater providers are being consulted. If \$ not needed for nutrient removal, then committee of wastewater providers will decide how to use the money to help reduce nutrient loading and improve water quality.

Projects - \$4M

50,000 – added to grant \$ to construct Berthoud Pass sediment removal pond above Denver's intake on Fraser River. This allows sediment to be removed before it can be released into the Fraser River. (Denver will own and operate in conjunction with disposal by CDOT & Grand County).

3.95M - Winter Park Recreation and Winter Park Water & Sanitation District have pump back and storage projects that will help the flows in the Fraser Rivers. Grand County will work with these entities to decide the proper split based on their ability to design and construct and within what timeframe.

Additional Funds

~~1M to pay one-half of annual pumping costs to Grand County if water available to pump from Windy Gap to Lake Granby for late summer release to Colorado River.~~

Denver will add a 12.5% charge to the sale of any future water sold outside its combined service area (short term and in cases of emergency) and place that money in a fund for use on the west slope. ~~2.5% of that revenue will be dedicated for forest health activities in Grand County and Summit County.~~ The remainder will be for water projects, water quality and/or environmental programs on the west slope. The River District will be the steward of the funds.

OTHER

No storage in environmental pool in Gross Reservoir for Boulder & Lafayette from water from west slope, directly or by exchange, unless agreed to by River District, Middle Park, Grand County.

Denver lands for Habitat and Access – Study which lands in Denver ownership that may have potential value for wildlife habitat and public fishing access without impacting Denver's operational needs.

Support CWCB filing (could help protect the 1000 af for the stream)

Support for RICD (recreational in-stream channel diversion)

Geographic Caps on area Denver can serve with west slope water.

Administration issues on Green Mountain Reservoir.

Settlement of Blue River Decree Issues (IMPORTANT TO MIDDLE PARK & ITS contractees).

Denver will not divert any water for storage in Gross enlargement until such time as water committed by Denver is legally available for use by Grand County.

5412 ½ af. of water for endangered fish in 15 mile reach being released from Granby Reservoir.

THERE ARE A VARIETY OF LEGAL ISSUES ASSOCIATED WITH THE AGREEMENT. ALL SIGNATORIES TO THE AGREEMENT MUST COOPERATE TO IMPLEMENT THE ENHANCEMENTS. NOTHING IS A DEAL UNTIL EVERYTHING IS A DEAL.

THERE MAY BE THINGS IN THIS AGREEMENT YOU LIKE AND THINGS YOU DON'T LIKE, BUT WHAT IS IMPORTANT IS IF THE BALANCE OF ALL THE ENHANCEMENTS IS POSITIVE FOR THE RESOURCE OF THE FRASER AND COLORADO RIVERS...

WHAT ABOUT MITIGATION??????

Grand County has made extensive comments on the DEIS, pointing out what we think are inadequacies, supporting our comments with science, studies, etc. As a consulting agency, we have met with the Corps and EPA numerous times explaining, clarifying and providing additional information (when requested) to support the position for proper mitigation.

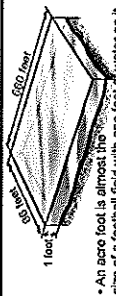
WE HAVE STRUGGLED TO KEEP ENHANCEMENTS AND MITIGATION SEPARATE – BECAUSE DENVER IS OFFERING ENHANCEMENTS TO ADDRESS CURRENT CONDITIONS – THEY SHOULD NOT GET, NOR DOES GRAND COUNTY WANT THEM TO GET CREDIT FOR THE ENHANCEMENTS ALSO AS MITIGATION. DENVER HAS AGREED.

GRAND COUNTY CONTINUES TO SUPPORT ITS COMMENTS AND POSITION TO THE PERMITTING AGENCIES – DENVER DOES THE SAME. IN THE END, THE AGENCIES WILL MAKE A DECISION BASED ON ALL INPUT AND THEIR CRITERIA FOR A DECISION.

One Acre Foot of Water Volume



- An acre foot is almost the size of a football field with one foot of water on it.
- One acre foot is approximately 325,851 gallons. One acre foot of water serves about two families of four for one year.
- Average residential customer's water usage (A family of four can use 400 gallons of water a day, up to 750 gallons in the summer).
- 54% landscaping, 19% toilets (An older toilet uses up to seven gallons of water per flush), 10% showers and baths (The bathroom is the largest consumer of indoor water), 11% laundry, 8% faucets, 5% leaks, and 1% dishwashers.
- Cubic Feet Per Second (cfs)
A rate of water flow passing a given point, amounting to a volume of one cubic foot for each second of time. Equal to 7.48 gallons per second, 448.8 gallons per minute or two acre feet per day.
