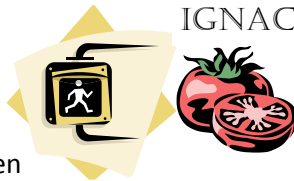

Summer Projects Reminder

PLEASE REMEMBER: IF YOU ARE PLANNING TO INSTALL A FENCE, PORCH, CARPORT, OR STEEL CONTAINERS OR DO ANY REMODELING AT YOUR HOME, YOU MUST FIRST CHECK WITH TOWN HALL TO SEE IF A BUILDING OR EXCAVATION PERMIT IS REQUIRED. IF YOU HAVE A CONTRACTOR DOING THE WORK, THEY MUST ALSO HAVE A CURRENT TOWN CONTRACTORS LICENSE, WHICH IS \$50.00 FOR A YEAR.

THE EXCAVATION PERMIT IS \$10.00 AND THE BUILDING PERMIT COST IS DETERMINED BY THE TOWN BUILDING INSPECTOR.

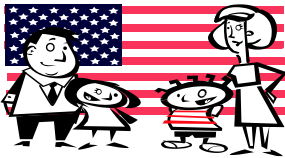

Manager's Corner We had a pretty successful Spring Clean-Up Week although it was pared back to four days in order to meet annual budgetary constraints. Keep in mind that we will be doing another four day clean up the first full week in October. We have just renegotiated a five year trash collection contract with Transit Waste and starting in June you will see the new lower rates. They (Transit Waste) will also continue to do our two annual clean up weeks.

A big thank you to all the schools staff and students in Town that contributed to the spring cleanup by doing a very well organized trash patrol of all our streets and alleys.

Sure seems that just yesterday we were reminding everyone about the need to stay on top of weed control in and around your properties. Such is the nature of getting old, I guess. Well, with the much needed recent rains of the past week, here we go again.

A Reminder: Due to the possibility of damage to the water pipe riser on the Raw Water service line, the Town does not allow property owners to repair the 1" valve should it need servicing. Please contact Town Hall and our Maintenance Staff will schedule a time to replace or repair the valve. You will be billed in your utility bill should we need to replace the valve.

School is out and youth will be more prevalent on our streets and right-of-ways please be on the lookout for them.

We believe that one of the most important responsibilities of government is to help insure the safety and well being of its citizens. With that in mind, we will monthly remind all that read this newsletter of the importance of displaying a visible address on your home where it can be easily seen by any emergency responding service from the street. SUCAP Board Election

Southern Ute Community Action Programs, Inc. is required to elect members into Category II of their Board every other year. SUCAP is a "Community Action Program" and follows the "CAP" model for its elections.

CAP's commonly use the "Tripartite Board" model where their Board is represented by 1/3 Community Agencies, 1/3 Government or Elected officials, and 1/3 Elected by the Community At Large.

SUCAP will hold its bi-ennial election Tuesday, June 7th, 2011 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Unlike State or County voting, you **do not** have to be registered to vote. You must, however, be 18 years old and live in the Ignacio School District or on the Southern Ute Indian Reservation.

There are six (6) vacant seats in category ii – *those elected by the community at large*. The following individuals are running for a two-year term: *in alphabetical order*

Voting will take place at SUCAP Central Administration, 285 Lakin street (970) 563-4517.
