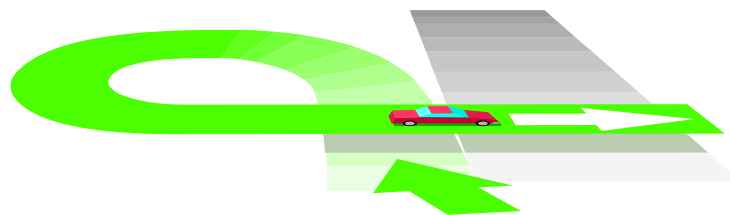

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Update - Open Space and Arapahoe & Parker Road Interchange

The Norfolk and McDanal open space grants will combine open space, a bicycle/pedestrian trail corridor, that utilizes tunnels for grade separated crossings, for the trail under the Ring Road and Loop Road to Foxfield Village Center and the new Parker/Arapahoe Road interchange, and provide access to the Cherry Creek Trail.

The development of the open space properties, water quality facilities, and trails is cooperative partnership between Foxfield, Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT), Arapahoe County, and Urban Drainage. The grants provided a unique opportunity to purchase both properties and leverage the development of the open space and trail with CDOT's development of the Arapahoe and Parker Road interchange. CDOT is providing a significant cost savings by providing the design, grading, grade separated crossings, a water detention facility, and installation of the trail through the Norfolk and McDanal open spaces. This project would not be possible without the coordinated effort of all parties.

The Project has been delayed while CDOT acquires the right-of-way for the interchange and the remaining funding. The Ring Road was fully funded (\$7M), however, a decision was made to combine the Ring Road and intersection into

one project to get it completed earlier and reduce costs. Stimulus funds thought to be available were used for other projects. The objective now is to come up with the funding to complete the intersection or decide to proceed with construction of the Ring Road.

Urban Drainage reviewed and approved plans for the water quality facility in April. The valuation of the right-of-way was completed in April and we are in the middle of the 90 day appraisal period scheduled to be completed by July 31st. The Final Office Review (FOR) is scheduled to be completed by mid July. If condemnation is necessary it could be completed by the end of October. The critical item is the remaining funding. 2010 funding becomes available July 1, 2009. This leaves approximately a \$10M gap in the funds required to complete the intersection. Arapahoe County and CDOT in August and September will be working to identify stimulus money, advancement of 2011 funding, and local funding. Depending upon the availability of funding a decision will be made in September whether to build the entire interchange at once or build the Ring Road and build the intersection later. Whichever decision is made hopefully construction could start in early 2010.

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Coyote Call - By Susan Current

This is the second installment of the series on Myth vs. Fact concerning coyotes and their behavior taken from the presentation given by Mary Ann Bonn ell from the Aurora of Parks and Open Space Department.

Coyotes live and hunt in packs

Myth. Hunting style depends on prey, habitat, and time of year. Most research shows that coyotes are primarily solitary hunters, but may hunt cooperatively with family members, particularly in winter. They may team up to take large prey.

Lifestyle depends on age and dominance. May live a solitary and transient lifestyle, may be a monogamous pair, or in family groups dominated by alpha male and female (alpha pair with 1-5 subordinates that are relatives) In some urban areas, coyotes may defend territories as groups with 5-6 adults and their offspring.

Coyotes never attack humans

Myth. It is extremely rare, but coyotes have been known to bite humans. In most cases, coyotes that bite humans have been fed by humans and are habituated. It is important to note that in the US, an average of 2.2 people per year are killed by vending machines.

I should be nice to the coyote when it is in my neighborhood

Myth. You should haze a coyote that is in your yard or roaming the streets of your neighborhood. Hazing includes: bright lights, banging on pots and pans, speaking forcefully, tossing rocks, etc. A coyote *should not feel welcome* in your backyard or neighborhoods.

Coyotes are smarter than my pet dog or cat

Fact. Years of wild living trump your pet's breeding for looks and demeanor. No matter how smart you think your dog or cat is, they are no match for a savvy suburban coyote.

Coyotes are naturally skittish around humans

Fact. A wild coyote possesses a natural fear of humans. A coyote that has been fed or welcomed into a neighborhood or yard will lose its fear of humans. A coyote that is not afraid of humans is *habituated*.

Humans create a food and habitat rich environment for coyotes

Fact. "Anthropogenic sources of food and water in the form of unsecured garbage, pet food, free-roaming cats and small dogs, rodents, fruit trees, fruits, ponds, and irrigation systems can attract coyotes." (Freudian *et al* 2001)

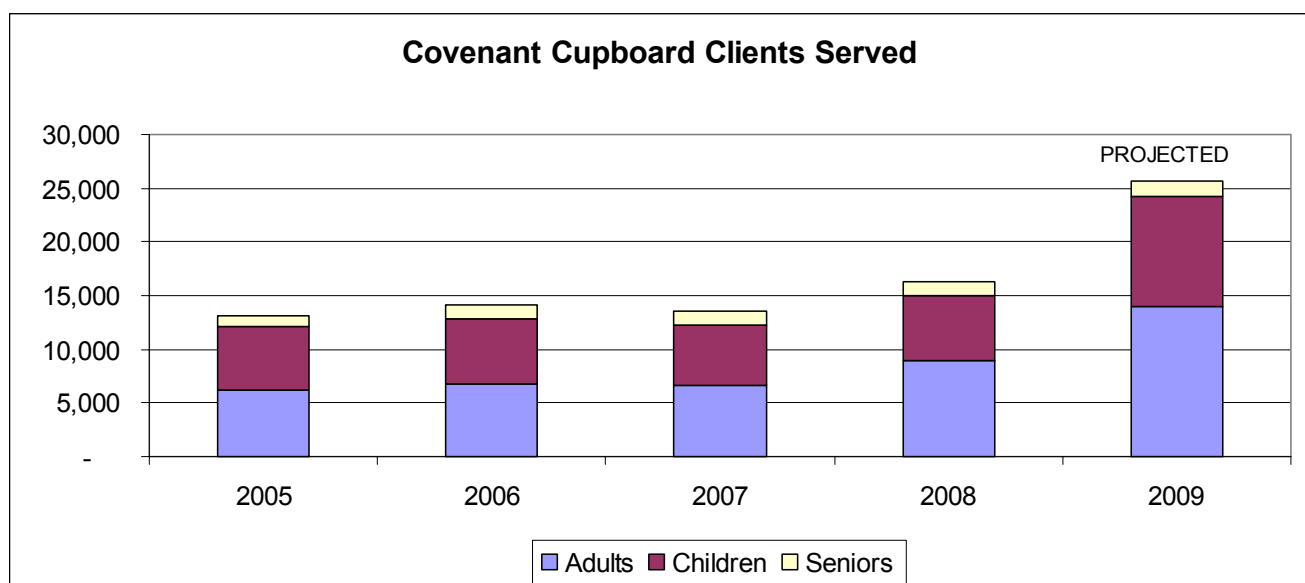

Covenant Cupboard Food Pantry (CCFP) is an all-volunteer nonprofit organization formed in 1995 as an outreach mission project of Presbyterian Church of the Covenant to address the food security needs of seniors, disabled individuals, and the unemployed or underemployed households in our community in a compassionate, dignified and secure environment. Covenant Cupboard strives to provide households with foods that meet USDA nutritional guidelines and provide information on preparing balanced meals. Families in need of food receive non-perishable items, dairy, produce, meat and grain products. Covenant Cupboard also provides books weekly for children and toys during the Christmas Holiday.

Covenant Cupboard, located at 5400 S. Yosemite St in Greenwood Village, serves food on Fridays between 1-4 pm and operates today in alliance with several other area churches including Bennett Presbyterian, Calvary Presbyterian, St. Peter Lutheran, Good Shepherd Episcopal, and St. Catherine Greek Orthodox Church, in addition to numerous other non-secular organizations and volunteers. Covenant Cupboard also sponsors a food pantry located in Bennett, CO on Saturdays in response to the growing need in that area.

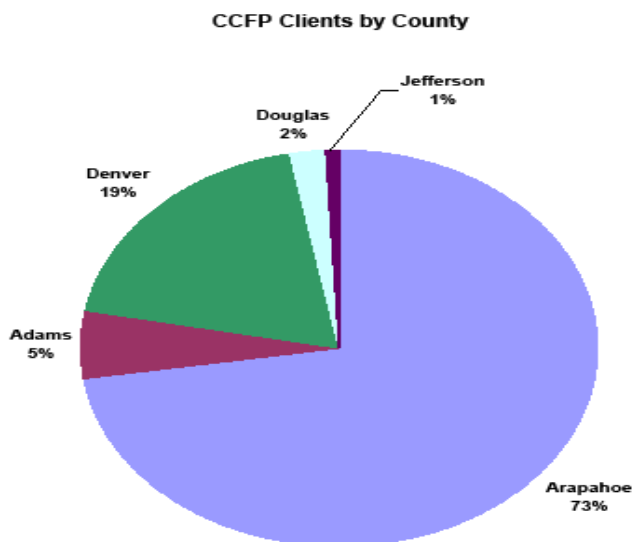
In 2008, Covenant Cupboard in Greenwood Village and Bennett combined, served a total of 16,000 adults, children and seniors comprised of 735 families who made a total of 4857 visits to the food pantry. In 2008, families were served a total of about 6,500 boxes of food. To date in 2009, Covenant Cupboard has experience a 50% increase in the number of families who visit the pantry. Between Jan-Apr an average of 87 families visited Covenant Cupboard and approximately 6-10 new families signed up for food each week. Due to the economic downturn, we anticipate the increase demand for food to continue in 2009 and anticipate that Covenant Cupboard in Greenwood Village and Bennett will serve a total of 26,000 clients in 2009.



The majority of clients served by Covenant Cupboard live in Arapahoe County (73%). 19% live in Denver County, and the remaining 8% live in Douglas and Jefferson Counties.

Present principal funding of Covenant Cupboard consists of financial support and grants, in-kind gifts of food and donations. Chipotle Mexican restaurant, Whole Foods and King Soopers contribute food on a weekly basis.

With the increase in demand combined with the economic downturn, **Covenant Cupboard will not be able to meet the projected needs in 2009 and beyond** and is currently seeking to expand

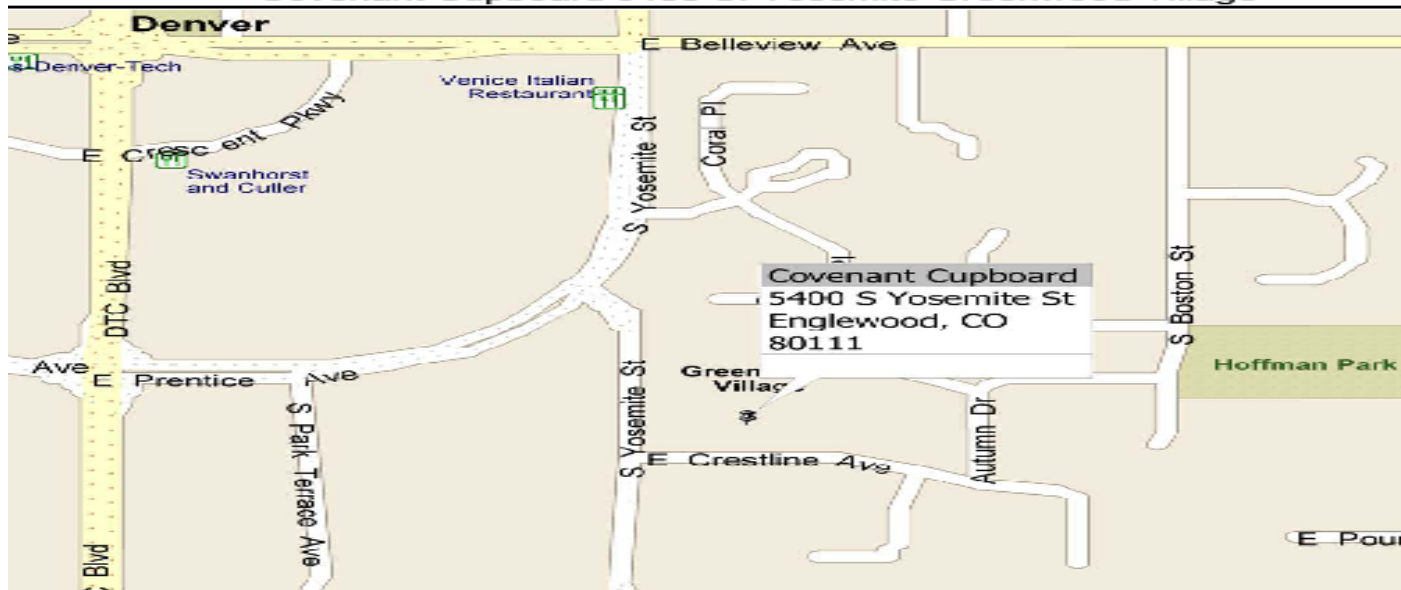

Weeds and Flowers on Rows and Properties by Doug Headley

Foxfield is a unique rural residential community - open spaces, narrow roads, ditches, setback fences, and horses. The town has worked for several years to make the Rows respectable. The weeds in the ROW are under control and the grass is thriving. The Town mows the Rows where the ditches and check dams are too difficult to mow. The ROW along Arapahoe Road has also been brought under control and is respectable. In general the Town's Rows are looking good.

The challenge now is to control several of the weeds that have invaded properties. Changes in the weather and the amount of moisture have brought unknown weeds to life. Many fields on properties are covered with flowering weeds that are aggressive and will eventually crowd out the native grasses. They take water that the native grass needs. Their seeds and roots are more aggressive than the native grasses.

For the most part the flowerings you see in fields are weeds. Yes, there are wildflowers; however, the majority of the flowering in most fields is from a variety of weeds. The tall upright flower that looks like a Snapdragon is actually **Dalmatian Toadflax**. It is very aggressive and can only be controlled with licensed herbicides. Do not let it go to seed. As a last resort dig out with a shovel or mow until it can be controlled with a herbicide. The yellow clusters of small flowers on a light green plant is **Leafy Spurge**. It reproduces from seeds and has an extensive aggressive root system. Herbicide is best applied before mowing. The purplish-pink flowers is **Red stem Filaree**. It starts out as a weed. It seeds prolifically and spreads forming a blanket that chokes out the native grasses. It has a thick tap root and is difficult to extract from the ground unless the ground is wet. **Bindweed** (Morning Glory) flowers are and white or pink funnel shaped flowers and appear in early June. It reproduces from seed and has extensive roots 4 to 8 feet in the ground. Pulling or digging it out futile. The most effective herbicide for Bindweed is Drive. **Puncturevine** (Goatheads) appear as yellow flowers in the heat of July. They rapidly grow into octopus-like vines with green tack-like fruit with sharp needle like spines. They are an annual. Treat yellow flowers with herbicide immediately. Once vines grow and fruit appears the vine must be removed by the center stem and placed in a garbage bag. **Kochia** is an erect annual with many evenly spaced stems and alternate leaves that can grow 3 to 6 feet in height. The main stem often tinged with red veins. It is typically mistaken for Tumble weed. It like Tumble weed should be removed or mowed before it goes to seed. The licensed herbicide Vista is one of the few herbicides that is effective in killing it.

The Town will begin an educational and enforcement program for weeds this summer. Educational materials will be mailed to all property owners. Properties with the worst weed problems will be notified that they have to come up with a plan to get the weeds on their property under control. In March and April of next year enforcement notices will be sent out to individual property owners.

It will take a cooperative effort of all residents to bring the weeds under control. The aggressive root systems know no boundaries. The prolific seeds are easily spread the Foxfield's winds. Birds and grazing animals transplant many varieties of seeds.

The Town looks forward to working with everyone to keep the native grasses in Foxfield thriving.

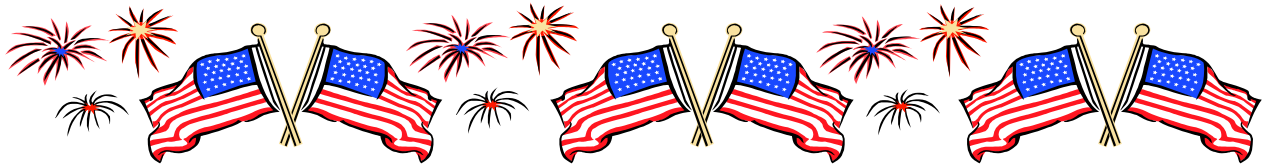

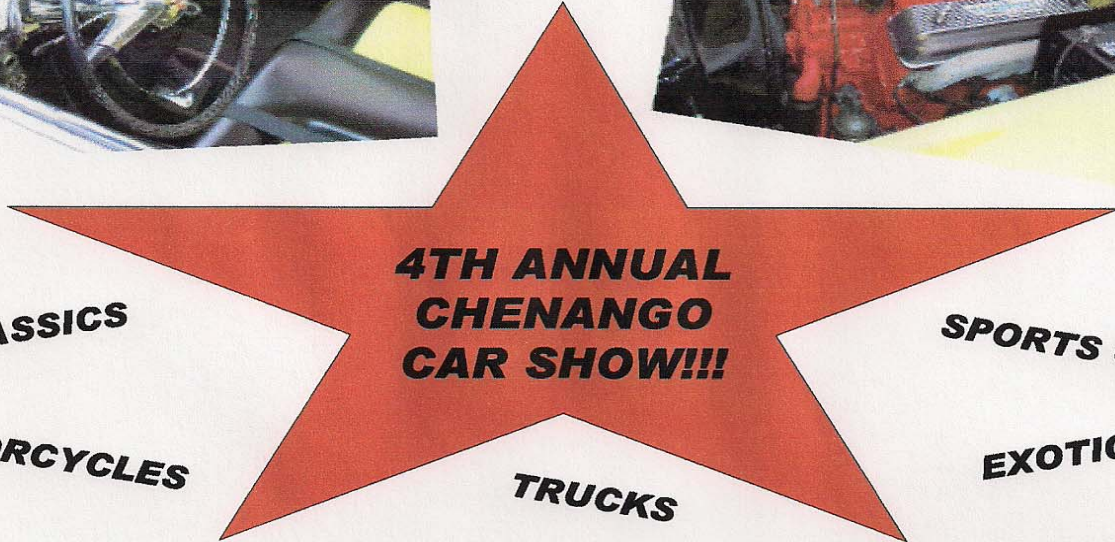
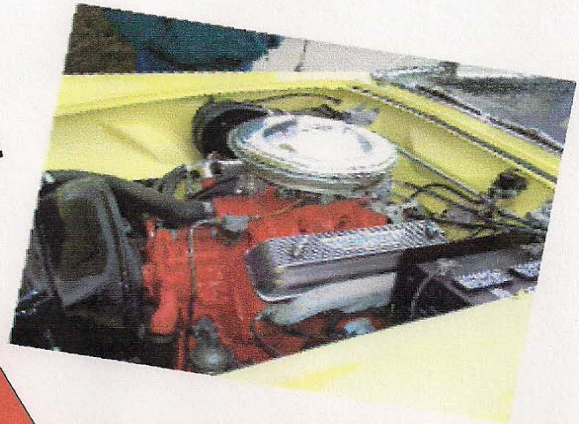

The meeting was called to order at 6:38 p.m. at Parker Fire Protection District Station No. 2, Foxfield, CO, 80016.

Trustee Lenane discussed the following:

Trustee Lenane asked the Board to review the financial reports provided by the Town Clerk and informed them that it is their responsibility to know and understand the financial status of the town's funds.

Mayor Pro Tem Watson discussed the following:

Mayor Pro Tem Watson informed the Board that she, Mayor Headley and the Town Clerk participated in an on-line webinar from Sakercom, who designs and hosts websites. She stated the company has preset modules which can be tweaked to meet the Town's needs. She stated she felt the product was good, easy to update and very affordable as it would only cost \$49 per month for them to host it. Mayor Pro Tem Watson asked the Board if anyone was opposed to the Town using the system. Trustee Lenane asked if there was a second backup location and if they had a business connectivity plan. The Board approved

Mayor Pro Tem Watson moving forward with this company once she addressed Trustee Lenane's questions.

Mayor Pro Tem Watson reported that on April 21st, she will be attending a demonstration of FORTIS, as an option for electronic data storage and retention.

Trustee Jones discussed the following:

Trustee Jones informed the Board she spoke with Paul Gibbs of DRCOG regarding the DRCOG grant. Mr. Gibbs anticipated having contract out in the next week.

Trustee Current discussed the following:

Trustee Current expressed concern on how to handle the excess mulch from the Clean Up Days if residents did not take all of it. Trustee Frank stated the chipper company has said they have never had that situation and the company would haul off any remaining mulch should it be necessary.

Trustee Current reported she is working on the July 4th parade/picnic. She stated she has had few people volunteer. Trustee Current asked Mayor Pro Tem Watson if she would consider hosting the picnic again this year. Mayor Pro Tem Watson stated she would discuss this issue with her family.

Trustee Easton discussed the following:

Trustee Easton had nothing new to report.

Trustee Frank discussed the following:

Trustee Frank informed the Board he has been addressing the street corners in town that are eroding. He stated it will cost approximately \$170 per corner to have hot asphalt put on the corners and there are thirty four corners that need to be repaired. Trustee Frank informed the Board that if the repair work isn't done water will set in the pavement and eventually crack it. The Board discussed the issue and determined they didn't account for the repair costs in this year's budget.

Trustee Frank received a call that a live power line was down on Lewiston. He stated the construction trailer that was using the line packed up and left leaving a live power line lying on the road. IREA turned the power to the line off and Trustee Frank is addressing getting the line removed. Mayor Headley spoke with a representative of CDOT who stated they had New Design Construction address the issue.

Mayor's Report – 8:29 p.m.

Mayor Headley informed the Board that the Girls Hope home has a contract to purchase the home at Richfield and Arapahoe.

Mayor Headley reported that a letter was sent to a property owner on Yampa Ct. regarding right-of-way violations on her property. The property owner had received the letter and contacted Town Attorney, Corey Hoffmann.

Mayor Headley, Mayor Pro Tem Watson, Trustee Frank, and Corey Hoffmann attended a meeting with representatives of the Jehovah's Witness congregation to address pending issues.

Unfinished Business- 8:36 p.m.

Electronic Data Storage – Mayor Headley informed the Board that the Town may have to hire someone part time to work on going through all of the Town's documents to determine what should be kept and what should be eliminated. He stated this needs to be done to meet records retention requirements and it should be done prior to storing documents electronically.

Regulations Enforcement – Trustee Jones provided the Board with a Code Enforcement monthly report. She stated thirty three violations have been addressed in the last three months. Trustee Jones stated the residents have been receptive to the new process and has worked with Susie Ellis to rectify the violations. Trustee Jones also provided the Board with examples of the notices that are sent to the residents that are violating town ordinances.

Trustee Jones informed the Board that a resident has requested to retain his current fence but would also like to put up a second fence outside of the existing fence. The Board suggested that Trustee Jones should review the initial permit application and also review the Town's ordinances to determine if the second fence would result in a violation.

Resident Arnie Wills addressed the Board regarding the violation noticing process. He stated he received a second notice, but never received the first notice. Trustee Jones stated that Ms. Ellis posts the first notice on the property somewhere, as on the fence. Mr. Wills stated he never saw the first notice and suggested that the notices be mailed to the residents. The Board agrees with Mr. Wills suggestion. The Board discussed if the Town could legally bill the residents for any expenses incurred by the Town while addressing the violation on their property. The Board agreed this could only happen if the Town has

to begin the abatement process. They stated that ten percent could be added to the costs for administration fees.

Trustee Frank informed the Board he had received a request to build an area to hold trash cans in the front of a residence. Trustee Frank informed the contractor that items cannot be placed in the Town right-of-way.

Correspondence – 7:35 p.m.

The Board discussed an email sent by the Town Clerk regarding creating a process for email communications. The Board discussed having a server host the Board's emails. Trustee Lenane stated she would research the costs this type of service.

Town will have to hold an election to fill the position.

Trustee Easton discussed the following:

Trustee Easton informed the Board he had nothing new to report.

Trustee Jones discussed the following:

Trustee Jones provided the Board with a letter highlighting various fencing regulations that may apply to a possible ordinance violation where a property owner has put up a fence outside of his already existing fence. She stated that Code Enforcement Officer, Susie Ellis, has asked the Board to direct her on what ordinances have been violated. Trustee Jones stated that although the fence ordinance does not prohibit double fences, it does state that “on a given property, all fence segments that run along the town right-of-way, whether the fence is located on the property line or set back from the property line, shall be constructed of the same style and material”. The fence on both the front and west side of the property do run along a town right-of-way and should therefore be constructed of the same style and material. Trustee Con Frank agreed to review the permit that was obtained and discuss the issue with the Town Attorney. Trustee Jones asked the Board if they would approve the removal of the double fence only along the right-of-way segments which would be the front and west property lines. The Board concurred

Trustee Jones discussed a request from a resident to screen building materials that are in violation on his property. Trustee Jones informed the resident that the materials need to be in an enclosed structure and the resident asked if he could be granted a variance from the regulation. Mayor Headley stated the important thing is to be consistent in every situation. Trustee Jones informed the Board that Susie Ellis will be at the next Board meeting to discuss violations in Town.

Mayor Headley discussed the status of the application for the DRCOG grant.

Trustee Current discussed the following:

Trustee Current informed the Board she had contacted the fire station and they have agreed to allow the Town to pile branches on their property to be chipped no later than the following Monday. Trustee Current contacted Premier who stated the cost for a large dumpster is \$250. They will pick up

the filled dumpsters on Friday and return on Saturday with empty dumpsters that they will dump throughout the day as needed. The cost on Saturday will be \$275 per each large dumpster. Trustee Current stated she still needs more volunteers and she will resent the email requesting help. Trustee Current informed the Board that Trustee Easton will now be handling electronic recycling for the Clean Up Days event.

Trustee Current reported that the Watson’s have agreed to host the July 4th picnic again this year. Trustee Current stated she would like the Board to consider buying tents so the picnic can be held anywhere.

Trustee Frank discussed the following:

Trustee Frank informed the Board there were no permits over the \$20,000 limit in April so there will be no revenue to the Town for that month.

Trustee Jones informed the Board she met with Susie Ellis to discuss the status of violations in Town. The Board discussed how a resident resolved a violation on E. Davies Avenue. The Board agreed that the property owner is no longer in violation of Town ordinances and he should be notified that his violation has been resolved. The Board determined that a notice should be sent to the property owner that shut down his home based business to acknowledge his compliance with the Town's ordinance. The Board discussed addressing and finalizing violations that were identified prior to hiring Susie Ellis to handle code enforcement.

Trustee Frank discussed the following:

Trustee Frank informed the Board he assisted a property owner in resolving issues he/she was having with obtaining a permit from Arapahoe County.

Trustee Frank discussed the property on Hinsdale that is in violation of the fencing ordinance. He stated the double fence along the right-of-way needs to be removed to be in compliance with the Town's regulations.

Trustee Frank discussed renovation work that is being done to a property on S. Waco St. Trustee Frank stated the property owner failed to pull the appropriate permits and a stop work order has been issued until the appropriate permits have been obtained.

Mayor's Report – 8:42 p.m.

Mayor Headley informed the Board that a reporter from the Denver Post had contacted him regarding writing an article on Foxfield. The article should appear in the Sunday, May 24th edition of the newspaper.

Mayor Headley discussed possible replacements for the vacated Trustee At-Large position.

Mayor Headley informed the Board that Weed Wrangler did a good job of applying weed control to the Town right-of-ways.

Mayor Headley discussed the status of the DRCOG grant. He informed the Board that CIRSA finally sent over the requested insurance information and the process is now completed.

Mayor Headley informed the Board the Centennial Airport Authority is trying to create a round table group with representatives from all of the surrounding communities. Trustee Easton volunteered to represent Foxfield in the discussions.

Mayor Headley contacted Singing Hills to discuss landscaping options along the east side of the Ring Road and modifications that will require less water. Mayor Headley stated that Singing Hills will replace trees and shrubs that have died and rework the soil around the existing shrubs to provide aeration.

Mayor Headley reported that CDOT sent a Notice of Intent to acquire land to construct the remaining portion of the Ring Road. The value of the land could be more than \$5,000 so they have asked the Town to have the property appraised. Since that first notice CDOT has sent a form requesting the Town to donate the land for the Ring Road. Mayor Headley stated he will discuss this issue with Town Attorney, Corey Hoffmann, and suggested possibly donating the land in exchange for other items the Town needs.

Mayor Headley attended a Parker Road Corridor Study meeting. He stated they have been working on this study for over a year and the City of Aurora has now stated they will not agree to anything that requires approval from the City of Centennial or the Town of Foxfield.

Unfinished Business- 9:00 p.m.

Electronic Data Storage – this issue will be addressed when Mayor Pro Tem Watson returns from her vacation.

Email – Mayor Headley stated the Town is researching a centralized email server so that Trustees do not use their personal email provider and email at home for Town business.

Minutes - BOT Special Meeting - June 1, 2009

Call to Order/Roll Call

The meeting was called to order at 11:36 p.m. at Parker Fire Protection District Station No. 2, Foxfield, CO, 80016.

The following Trustees were present:

Bob Easton, Susan Current, Con Frank, Lisa Jones, Mayor Pro Tem and Mayor Doug Headley.

A quorum was present.

CODE ENFORCEMENT VIOLATIONS AND ENFORCEMENT

The Board discussed various stock piling violations around the Town and the fact that the Town needs to be consistent in how they address all violations. Code Enforcement Officer, Susie Ellis, stated if the Town allows one property owner to partially comply with the Town's ordinances then they cannot expect full compliance from other property owners. Town Attorney stated that some residents have items stored on their properties in a neat pile or they aren't visible to people passing by. These situations are not considered a nuisance and they don't have to be and it is up to the Board to determine what is a violation. He suggested that the Board determine what is the end goal, whether it is to make the community look pristine or just neat. Mayor Headley stated the goal is to

make the Town look respectable. Corey Hoffmann stated that piles of junk that are offensive to neighbors or the community would be considered a nuisance, but this is determined by the Board and there is no violation for selective enforcement. Susie Ellis stated she was comfortable with using reasonableness when addressing violations in Foxfield because of the unique nature of the rural community. The Board had a lengthy discussion regarding what is considered degradation and what is a viable pile of items. The Board discussed what a reasonable standard is, and they concurred that properties have to look like 75% of the other properties in Town.

The Board discussed violations in Town where a property has more than five licensed vehicles. The Board discussed whether or not a trailer is considered a vehicle and Corey Hoffmann stated the ordinance defines a vehicle as anything that requires a registered license. He also reminded the Board a property owner can have more than five vehicles; they just have to be kept in a garage or barn. The Board agreed their main concern is the vehicles that are abandoned on the property or residents who store vehicles for other people. The Board discussed requiring vehicles to be parked on a pad or gravel, but decided that would present more issues.

The Board discussed what would be considered dilapidation. They identified two properties in Town that they considered severely dilapidated and asked Susie Ellis to send them a notice. Susie Ellis stated that the goal when addressing dilapidated homes is to preserve property values, which may be reduced due to unsightly neighboring properties.

The Board discussed how to address noxious weed violations. Both Corey Hoffmann and Susie Ellis emphasized how important it is to follow the abatement process when addressing weed violations. The Board discussed how the process takes approximately six weeks and the weeds will have spread to other properties in that time. Corey Hoffmann stated this violation is hard to prosecute if the process isn't followed. Susie Ellis suggested including a flyer of how to eradicate noxious weeds with each notice sent out.

The Board informed Ms. Ellis that she could proceed with sending out abatement notices to five property owners that have received first and second notices but have not contacted Ms. Ellis to discuss resolving the violations on their properties.

Adjournment
