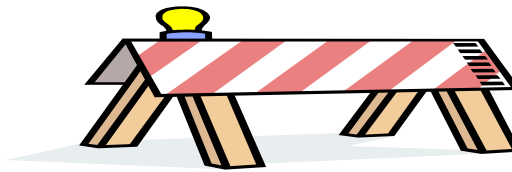
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ARAPAHOE/PARKER ROAD CONTRACTOR

IS ON-SITE

CDOT has awarded the contract for the interchange and Ring Road to Hamon Contractors, Inc. The project will take about 24 months to complete. CDOT has requested that the first phase include the completion of the Ring Road, water detention facilities, a large concrete culvert between the Ring Road and Loop Road, and the grading of the Loop Road and the detention pond in the center. East Costilla Avenue's access to Parker Road will be closed and it will be converted into a cul-de-sac and paved. The project schedule should be available soon and hopefully the first phase will be completed by Thanksgiving of this year.

After the construction easements for the Ring Road and culvert are released by CDOT the temporary grading and seeding of the Worsham property will be re-graded, moving, compacting and leveling the dirt stored on the south end, north to the base of the retaining wall on the south side of Foxfield Village Center.



CUT-THROUGH TRAFFIC IN FOXFIELD - By Doug Headley

During construction of the Arapahoe/Parker Road interchange the cut-through traffic in Foxfield will become a greater concern. Many residents have expressed concern regarding their safety and that of children going to and from school buses, people walking, bicycling and equestrians riding along the side of the roadways.

Knowing the Town would need help last year the Board of Trustees contracted with Stolfus & Associates to provide traffic engineering analysis and recommendations. Stolfus & Associates has been invited to the next Board meeting on May 20th to a discussion of the Town's concerns as the first step in understanding the problems with cut-through traffic. Several residents have spoken to the Board previously and we are requesting residents come forward again with your concerns, ideas, and recommendations. Cut-through traffic will be the first thing on the agenda at the May 20th board meeting.



RIGHTS-OF-WAYS

The Town has started maintenance on the he rights-of-way and islands. Pre-emergent was applied along Arapahoe Road, the islands, entrances and rip-rap in the ditches. In the coming week herbicide will be applied to selective areas in the ROW that are still a problem. Resident's requests the past two years to not have herbicides applied on their ROW are recorded on the map that the Weed Wrangler uses during the application. The Town, as in previous years, will continue to whip the check dams and mow the ROW's that are too difficult for residents to maintain. General ROW maintenance should begin by the middle of May.

The Towns and resident's efforts along Arapahoe Road have made the ROW respectable. The town will continue working with residents along Arapahoe Road to improve the property visible from Arapahoe Road. Property visible along Arapahoe Road needs at a minimum some form of mechanical weed management 2 or 3 times, beginning in May. Noxious weeds need to be eradicated or mitigated.

FYI, the locate flags and markings on along East Easter Avenue were placed there for ACWWA. They are designing a 24" water line that will be installed 5 feet off the north edge of the roadway from South Waco Street to Chaparral. The purpose the water line is to provide an alternative connection to ACWWA's storage tanks in Chaparral.

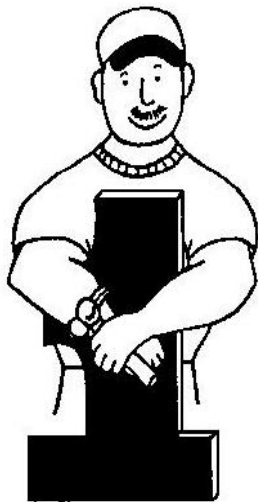

I can also mow your field after evaluation of objects, trees, etc. in the field (evaluation is free of charge). Mowing costs range from \$60-\$150 for weeds/grass up to 2 feet tall. If the weeds/grass is between 2-3 feet tall it will be \$50 extra, between 3-4 feet tall is \$100 extra and over 4 feet tall is \$150 extra.

THE ESSENCE OF NOXIOUS WEED MANAGEMENT

While weeds have long been a bane of agriculture, they have generally not been a problem for smaller property owners except in vegetable and flower gardens. However, this situation changes when ranches are converted to large-lot properties, especially where horses or livestock are grazed on small tracts of land. Weeds affect local wildlife, invade open space and can poison horses. New property owners are discovering that managing weeds is one of the responsibilities of land ownership. Unfortunately, many of these landowners don't have detailed knowledge about weeds.

One of the reasons for preparing and implementing a weed management plan for your property is to be a good neighbor. Being a good neighbor requires property owners to be alert for new weed infestations and to control existing infestations. Weed management is also much more successful if neighbors join together to control weeds that readily spread from place to place. Although private landowners and public land managers may have different perspectives on weeds, they share the common goal of protecting their property or management area from the negative effects of noxious weeds.

"Noxious weed management is a good neighbor policy. One should be neighborly and manage the noxious weeds infestations on their land. However, if one's neighbor refuses to manage their noxious weeds, that is no excuse to repeat their error. While it may be frustrating when a landowner manages their noxious weeds and their neighbor does not, it is never futile!"

WEED MANAGEMENT

Preventive management of fields with native and dry land pasture grass is the most effective way to prevent the introduction or establishment of noxious weeds into areas not currently infested with noxious weeds. Strong grasses will help keep weeds from growing. Prevention also includes the eradication of small new infestations. These measures usually are the most practical and cost-effective means of integrated weed management. The least expensive weed to manage is one that does not infest an area.

One of the basic steps in prevention is not letting weeds go to seed. The wind in Foxfield makes containment of the seeds from weeds a challenge. One resident's problem becomes everyone else's problem. One weed is not the concern, but

NOXIOUS WEED MANAGEMENT PLAN PUBLIC HEARING

The Board of Trustees held a public hearing on May 5th to discuss the adoption of a Noxious Weed Management Plan required by the State of Colorado. The Rural Residential Standards (RRS) Ordinance will implement Colorado's Noxious Weed Act and Noxious Weed Management Plan. Enforcement will continue through the RRS. The Public Hearing was continued until June 17th while the Board reviews and finalizes the Noxious Weed Management Plan.

What are noxious weeds?

The term "noxious" has a legal connotation with the Colorado Department of Agriculture non-native and invasive. Most noxious weed species in Colorado originated in Europe and/or Asia, and were unintentionally introduced into the United States as a contaminant in crop seed or on farm machinery. Some were intentionally introduced as ornamental plants, forage, or plants used as windbreaks or for soil stabilization. These non-native plants have proliferated or have the potential to proliferate in Colorado. This threat to Colorado's environment and economy has been recognized and addressed through the Colorado Noxious Weed Act. This Act, among other things, requires all local governing agencies to develop weed management plans for their jurisdictions. The Act has listed 71 weed species as noxious in Colorado. Seventy-one noxious weeds have been categorized into 3 lists based on their infestation level and management required.

Species on **List A** are potentially a large problem to this state, and require mandatory eradication by local governing agencies. The required management objective for **List B** species is eradication, containment and/or suppression, meaning prevention of dispersal of seed or other plant propagules. In most cases this is accomplished by mowing; though hand pulling, mechanical tillage, grazing, or herbicide application can also be effective. The goal of management plans for **List C** species is recommended but not required by the state, although local governing bodies may require management. The Board is discussing using its local authority to **locally declare** additional weeds as noxious that are a problem in Foxfield.

The Board of Trustees is considering an approach in our Noxious Weed Management Plan similar to the one used in Northglenn where the State of Colorado weed lists are listed, but attention is focused on the noxious weeds that are known to be a problem in Foxfield. The Board has chosen this approach because the number of noxious weeds is daunting yet those in Foxfield are limited. Northglenn has identified only two Class A noxious weeds and there may only be one, Myrtle spurge, in Foxfield. Focusing on the noxious weeds infesting Foxfield makes noxious weed management more reasonable. The list of Foxfield's noxious weeds will be known as the Priority Noxious Weed List.

Leafy spurge (*Euphorbia esula*) Class B
Musk thistle (*Cardus nutans*) Category B
Myrtle spurge (*Euphorbia myrsinites*) Class A
Puncturevine (*Tribulus terrestris*) Class C
Purple loosestrife (*Lythrum salicaria*) Class C
Redstem Filaree (*Erodium cictarium*) Class B
Russian Olive (*Elaeagnus angustifolia*) Class B
Sandbur (*cenchrus incertus; cenchrus longispinas*) locally declared
Scotch thistle (*Onopordum acanthium*) Class B
Tumbleweed (*Salsola tragus*) locally declared

Enforcement will continue through Foxfield's Rural Residential Standards. Enforcement is generally through mechanical methods, such as, mowing, pulling, or digging. The Board is considering an option in the Noxious Weed Management Plan that would allow residents not to mow their field if their fields do not contain any noxious weeds.

The Board believes that the adoption of a Noxious Weed Management Plan will help clarify and inform property owners of their responsibilities in managing the fields on their property.

Latex Paint Waste Disposal and Reduction Tips

- Water-based latex paint can be disposed of in regular household garbage **IF** it is completely dried out.
Mixing the paint with kitty litter, dirt, or concrete-mix will help speed the drying process.
- Dry cans of paint, with lids removed, can be discarded in the trash.
 - Buy only what you need by carefully estimating the square footage of the surfaces to be painted. One gallon of paint will cover about 350 square feet.
 - Ask your local paint store if they provide small (1-2 ounce) samples for color testing before investing in gallons of paint.
- Apply extra coats if you have excess paint.
- Give any leftover paint to a neighbor in need.

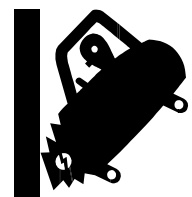

- Trash dumpsters will be located along Easter Way just east of the fire station between the hours of 9 am-5 pm on Friday 11 June and 8 am-noon on Saturday 12 June
- **IMPORTANT!!! We will have a limited number of dumpsters so come early.**
 - Residents may use the dumpsters to dispose of items not picked up in the weekly trash collection. ***For this service, a donation of \$10.00 per load is greatly appreciated.***
 - The following items may **not** be disposed of in the dumpsters: Hazardous waste, including appliances, refrigerators, microwaves, TVs, computers, A/C units; toxic or flammable materials such as paint, oil, gasoline cans, aerosol cans, propane containers, lawn mowers, other heavy items such as scrap metal, sod, concrete, tires, rock & dirt.
 - Only small loads of branches/limbs
- **Disposal of Appliances & Scrap Metal:**
 - Scrap Metal Hauling will collect items such as batteries, scrap metal and appliances, including dishwashers, refrigerators, washing machines and dryers. **Important: there will be a fee of \$10.00 per appliance and \$5.00 per battery for this service.** If you are unable to bring the appliance to the dumpsters, they can be picked up at your residence for \$25 (call Susan Current (303)-680-1986 to make arrangements)
- **Disposal of Vehicles & Farm Equipment:**
 - There is no charge to dispose of farm equipment or any operable or junked vehicle (no title needed), please contact Trustee Susan Current (303)680-1986 **prior to 1 June** to arrange for pick up.
- **Wood Chipper Service:**
 - J & J TREE CARE COMPANY will be coming around to **your** property this year to chip branches and is offering a discount on tree trimming to residents that weekend. Residents **must...**

ELECTRONIC RECYCLING

Best Buy has a free kiosk in any of their stores for dropping off old CDs, DVDs, cell phones, or ink-jet cartridges. Larger items can also be dropped off, such as DVD players, computers, and televisions (32 inches and under). There is a limit of two large items per household per day. There is a \$10 cost to recycle TVs, computer monitors, and laptops; however, you'll receive a \$10 Best Buy gift card in return.

Office Depot will recycle your ink or toner cartridges and cell phones for no charge. To dispose of devices like fax machines, computers, printers, scanners, digital and video cameras, DVD players, and small TVs, you purchase a small (\$5), medium (\$10), or large (\$15) recycling box which you fill and then leave at the store.

Radio Shack will take in MP3 players, cameras, phones, camcorders, gaming consoles, cell phones, and other small electronics. You will be given a gift card in exchange after a sales associate determines the value of your electronics.

Staples will give you \$3 in Staples coupons for each ink or toner cartridge you bring in. cell phones and any Dell product will be recycled for free. There is a \$10 charge per item to recycle non-Dell computers, fax machines, printers, and other large items.

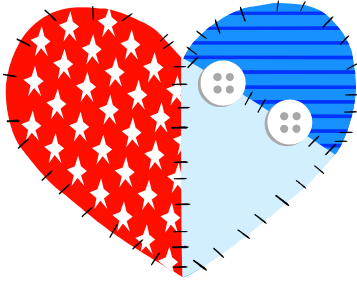

Minutes - BOT Regular Meeting - March 18, 2010

Call to Order/Roll Call

The meeting was called to order at 6:40 p.m. at Parker Fire Protection District Station No. 2, Foxfield, CO, 80016.

The following Trustees were present:

Bob Easton, Susan Current, Con Frank, Lisa Jones, Allyson Zoellner, Mayor Pro Tem Watson and Mayor Headley.

A quorum was present.

The following Staff was present:

Fred Fox, Town Planner

PUBLIC HEARING – Amending the Zoning Map

Mayor Headley opened the public hearing at 6:42 p.m. Town Planner, Fred Fox, stated the reason for the amendment is to be consistent with the adoption of the revised Zoning Ordinance and designate the three new zoning districts created in the document. Mr. Fox asked the Board if they would like him to include in the map the Ring Road, Loop Road and the land that belongs to CDOT. The Board concurred that these areas need to be identified as well. Mayor Headley opened the floor to comments from the public and hearing none he opened the floor to final comments from the Board.

- A **motion** was made by Mayor Pro Tem Watson to approve the Zoning Map with including the revisions of Costilla & Briarwood easements and the Loop and Ring Roads, along with adding the right-of-ways to the key. **Seconded** by Trustee Easton. **The motion passed unanimously.**

Minutes of the 3-4-10 Meeting and Approval

A **motion** was made by Trustee Frank to approve the 3/4/10 minutes as amended. **Seconded** by Trustee Current. **The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.**

Unfinished Business

- A. Animal Control Service Provider** – Trustee Jones stated she would send the approved ordinance to Arapahoe County.
- B. Waste Removal** – Charissa Eckhout received comments from Waste Management on the Board's revisions to the waste re-

moval agreement. The Board discussed the comments and made further revisions to the agreement. Ms. Eckhout stated she will have a revised agreement at the next meeting.

- C. Election** – Town Clerk, Becky Catterall, informed the Board she needs to cancel the election as she received the exact number of petitions as there were vacated seats.
 - A **motion** was made by Trustee Easton to approve Resolution No. 4, Series 2010, canceling the April 6, 2010, regular election and declaring candidates for the offices of Town Trustee. **Seconded** by Trustee Zoellner. **The motion passed unanimously.**

New Business

- A. Violation at 18156 E. Briarwood Pl.** – Charissa Eckhout reported that an agreement had been reached on the height violation at 18156 E. Briarwood Place. The builder has agreed to reduce the height of the roof by three feet. The Board had a lengthy discussion on possible resolutions to this issue.
 - A **motion** was made by Trustee Frank to accept the agreement for 18156 E. Briarwood Place. **Seconded** by Trustee Current. **For:** Trustees Current, Easton, Jones, Frank, Mayor Pro Tem Watson, and Mayor Headley. **Against:** Trustee Zoellner.

Reports

A. Committee

- a.** Trustee Frank was contacted by HP Geotech regarding drilling cores into the road for laying ACWWA's waterline from Waco to the east. Trustee Frank reported that CASI was in town doing crack sealing. He stated the bid they gave us only covered the re-sealing of old cracks, not newly identified cracks. He stated they will be back in Town to address the new cracks.
- b.** Trustee Jones discussed putting educational pieces in the newsletter to educate residents on what is a noxious weed.
- c.** Trustee Easton had nothing new to report.

- d. Trustee Current received a call from Arapahoe County asking if they could change the hours of off-duty patrols to better coincide with shift changes. The Board approved the request. Trustee Frank stated the chipping company the Town used during Clean Up Days has agreed to provide those services again this year. The Board agreed to charge \$25 a load for chipping this year.
- e. Mayor Pro Tem Watson attended an orientation on how to build the website. She purchased the new domain foxfield-colorado.com and is working on getting it up and running.

B. Mayor's Report – Mayor Headley attended a meeting on the construction of the new intersection at Parker and Arapahoe Roads. He stated the biggest issues facing the Town will be cut-through traffic. Mayor Headley discussed making streets one-way, which was approved by the Fire Department and the town Attorney. Mayor Headley is going to contact Planner, Elizabeth Stolfus to discuss mitigating traffic.

Mayor Headley reported he has been working on the Norfolk and McDanal Open Space reports. He stated the funds we have in open space accounts need to be spent in the next couple of years and he would like to hire an architect to help design the Town's open space.

- A. Mayor Headley suggested that the Board have a planning session. He provided the Board with a list of items to be considered. He asked if the Board would like to have a planning work session or use time during future meetings to prioritize the goals to be completed by the Board.
- B. Trustee Jones discussed the Planning Commission and how to develop procedures. She stated she will contact residents who have volunteered and let them know they have been selected.

Reports**A. Committee**

- a. Trustee Zoellner had nothing new to report.
- b. Trustee Jones provided the Board with an excerpt from the Colorado Revised Statutes regarding noxious weeds. She discussed Statute requirements and recommended expanding the Rural Residential Property Standards to include information from the state Statutes. Trustee Jones will work with Charissa Eckhout on creating an ordinance. Mayor Headley provided the Board with pictures of noxious weeds found in Town.
- c. Trustee Frank reported he had worked through a series of building permits and has created processes to address permit issues. The Board discussed the new building permit procedure. Trustee Frank discussed areas in Town where pavement is cracking and corners are breaking down. He stated he will meet with a pavement engineer and have them assess the Town's roads. Trustee Frank stated there are rebates for energy saving appliances that are available on a first come, first serve basis. He will email the information to the Town Clerk to be put out to the residents via email. Mayor Headley stated the fees for Singing Hills to landscape the Norfolk open space are \$198 per month for maintenance and a \$600 fee for trees. The Board approved the expenditure. Mayor Headley asked the Board for approval to have Weed

Wrangler spray the weeds in Town, which will cost approximately \$2,500. The Board approved the request.

- d. Trustee Current reported that resident Doris Rauh has once again volunteered to do the garage sale which will be on June 4th and 5th. Trustee Current contacted the company that collected scrap metal last year during the Clean Up Days to see if it is worthwhile for him to participate again this year. The Board discussed the issue. The Board determined they would not provide an electronic recycling collection place this year, but they will print a list of places that provide that service. Trustee Current suggested having the July 4th parade/picnic on Saturday July 3rd, not Monday July 5th. The Board concurred. Trustee Current discussed having a Coyote Management Plan, and stated she thought it was worthwhile to have residents fill out incident reports so the Board knew coyote activity in Town. The Board agreed.

B. Mayor's Report – Mayor Headley reported that CDOT will start construction on the Ring Road and flyover in May.
