Summer Reading Program

The Eaton Public Library will start its Summer Reading Programs during the week of June 2. Children entering grade one through grade 5 start on Wednesday, June 5 at 1:00 pm. Participants will be treated to an adventure each week as they "Treasure Your Library." Students will receive a log to keep track of reading 20 minutes each day of the six week program. Research shows that maintaining reading skills during the summer is vital to success in the school year. As part of the weekly summer adventure, young readers will go on a treasure hunt each week to locate a treasure coin at the participating businesses in Eaton. At the end of the program on July 10, students will be treated to a special visit from the Butterfly Pavilion of Denver. No pre-registration is required and there is no fee for participation.

Teens and 'tweens are invited to participate in the Young Adult Summer Reading running June 4th through July 9th. Youth entering 6th to 12th grades will be asked to read a total of five books from five different genres, write a short summary of each and then construct a diorama, collage or report that captures a character or story from one of the books. A closing party will be held on July 9th at 1:00 pm. Interested youth can sign up at the Library. A sign-up registration sheet is located in the Young Adult Room in the Library. There is no fee for participation.

New DVD's

Cloud Atlas. Future. Present. Past. Everything is connected. The story is a time-shifting weave of six interlinking narratives, with diverse settings from the savagery of a Pacific Island in the 1850s to a dystopian Korea of the near future. Based on the novel "Cloud Atlas" by David Mitchell.

The Bletchley Circle: Cracking a Killer's Code. Four women who worked as codebreakers at Bletchley Park have taken up civilian lives. Susan has collated data about a series of murders. She tries to convince the police she knows where another body is, but they are unable to locate it and dismiss her. She turns to her three friends and they work out where the next victim will be taken, find the body, then decide they are the only ones who can track down the killer.

Jack Reacher. From The New York Times bestselling author Lee Child comes one of the most compelling heroes to step from novel to screen - ex-military investigator Jack Reacher (Tom Cruise). When a gunman takes five lives with six shots, all evidence points to the suspect in custody. On interrogation, the suspect offers up a single note: "Get Jack Reacher!" So begins an extraordinary chase for the truth, pitting Jack Reacher against an unexpected enemy, with a skill for violence and a secret to keep and a target on Reacher's back.



New Audiobooks

Bunker Hill by Nathaniel Philbrick. Boston in 1775 was an island city occupied by British troops. In April, violence had erupted at Lexington and Concord. In June, with the city cut off from supplies by a British blockade and the Patriot militia poised in siege, outright war began in the Battle of Bunker Hill. This is a visceral account of the battle that ignited the American Revolution, from the bestselling author of Mayflower.

Inferno by Dan Brown. Harvard professor Robert Langdon (The Da Vinci Code) is drawn into a harrowing world centered on one of history's most enduring and mysterious literary masterpieces: Dante's Inferno. Battling a chilling adversary, he grapples with a riddle that pulls him into a landscape of classic art, secret passageways, and futuristic science. Also available as a new book.

Paris by Edward Rutherfurd. A multigenerational saga that takes listeners through thousands of years of glorious Parisian history, from its founding under the Romans through the martyrdom of Joan of Arc, manipulations of Cardinal Richelieu, conquests of Napoleon, beauty and optimism of the belle epoque, horrors of world war, to the present day.
