

Phantom Debt Collectors



Getting a call from a debt collector can be stressful. But it can be downright frightening when the caller uses lies, profanity and threats to try to get you to pay. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) says a debt collection operation in Charlotte, NC pretended to be lawyers. Really, they were not lawyers and had no authority to collect debts. The FTC says that the "Collectors" used a variety of names to make people think that they were dealing with a law firm. The imposters told people they were delinquent on a payday loan or other debt and threatened them with arrest, jail time, or getting sued unless they paid by credit or debit card over the phone. Sometimes the callers had personal information, like Social Security and bank account numbers, or relatives' names. The callers used this information to convince people that the calls were legitimate.

In truth, the FTC says that the defendants were pressured into paying debts they never owed.

You can't be arrested for not paying your bills. If a debt collector calls about a debt –and before you agree to pay anything –ask for a written proof that says how much money you owe and to who, and what to do if you don't think that you owe the money. By law, debt collectors have to send you a written document called a validation notice, within five days after they first contact you. IF they don't, that's a warning sign that they may not be legitimate. Debt collection complaints account for nearly one-third of consumer complaints to the FTC. IF you, or someone you know, has gotten, a suspicious debt collection call, report it to the FTC. With your help, we're finding the bad guys and putting them out of business!

Just the Facts -Salt!

Salt is sodium chloride, It is made up of 40% sodium by weight and 60% chloride. A 1 teaspoon serving of salt contains 2300 mg of sodium Sea salt and kosher salt may have a bit less sodium because fewer crystals fit onto the spoon.

There are various types of salt. When choosing between kosher salt, sea salt, and table salt, remember that it is probably mostly a matter of letting your taste buds decide what you like best. Whichever option you choose, keep in mind that all types of salt have about the same amount of sodium.

Table salt is processed to eliminate trace elements. Table salt is mined from underground salt deposits and is bleached, heated and contains the additive calcium silicate to prevent clumping. It imparts a sharper flavor than kosher or sea salt possibly due to it's fine texture. Minute amounts of iodine have been added to some table salts in an effort to stop iodine deficiencies that affect about 2 billion people world wide.

Sea Salt is produced from evaporation of ocean water or saltwater lakes. The main differences between sea salt and table salt are in their taste, texture and processing. Sea salt is produced through evaporation of ocean water or water from saltwater lakes, usually with little processing. Depending on the water source, this leaves behind certain trace minerals and elements. The minerals add flavor and color to sea salt, which also comes in a variety of coarseness.

Kosher salt can be made by compacting smaller granular flakes into larger irregular platelet shaped flakes or grown this way via the evaporation process. Minimally refined and sourced from either underground deposits or evaporated seawater, kosher salt tastes less salty that table or sea salt.

Which do you choose? All salts are about the same in sodium. Your decision should be based on the flavor that you enjoy. One of the keys to maintaining a heart-healthy diet is to control your sodium intake. The American Heart Association suggests that as a general rule, we lower the sodium in our diets. Do you know where you are getting most of your sodium?

Sources of Sodium:

5% Added during cooking

6% Added at the table

12% Naturally occurring

77% Food processing

Easy Pumpkin Chocolate Chip Cookies

Preheat oven to 350, lightly grease cookie sheet.

Marge's Meanderings – Meanderings in a minute.

COUNTY FAIR

There is nothing that makes my heart sing like going to the County Fair. It has always been that way. You have heard about people who like, "the smell of the grease paint, the roar of the crowd", well with me it was more, "the smell of popcorn, hot dogs, caramel apples, and cotton candy and the screams of the people on the gravity defying carnival rides". From the minute we walked into the gate at the fair my life was full of wonderment. The sights, the sounds, the lights, the exhibits, the crowds of people, all mesmerized me. I would stand there and take in all the excitement and then it was "off to the fair". When I was younger, I was usually in tow to a grown up, but they always seemed to love it too. You can call it, "country hicks in the big time" or whatever you want. We just called it pure fun!

My father had some influence in the political circles of our county and wonder of all wonders, he was able to get the County Fair moved to little ole Downey, Idaho. From then on, it was just two blocks to the fair from our house. We just had to walk a short way, get dizzy with all the things to do, and then go

home, rest a bit and then off we'd go again.

I still remember the butterflies flying around in my stomach, the day we could go in and see what prize we had won on our 4-H exhibits at the fair. Those blue ribbons were the ones we always hoped for. Now don't laugh because in those days it was important to know which weeds would kill your stock and which ones you could chew on. We worked very hard to make our weed presses. We had to make a board frame, then put slats inside of it and then strap it tight. We were into "weeds". Maybe that is why I am so good at growing weeds! Now, time to hunt for the weeds, identify them, press and dry them in the presses we created, and then make a scrapbook, identify each weed, tell its characteristics and whether it was poisonous or not. I worked so hard that I got one of the coveted blue ribbons. Funny that I don't remember the cooking and sewing that I did in 4-H. Maybe that is why I am better with weeds than homemaking.

This year my husband and I made our annual trek out to the Box Elder County Fair. The sights, the sounds, the exhibits, the friends were all there and so was the joy of being there. Our first stop was for a hamburger, hot dog and drink at the Farm Bureau booth. These days we see a lot of our friend's kids that are filling the shoes of their parents and grandparents. It was the same, when we went to see the cows and pigs (a must for my animal loving spouse). There were the children and grandchildren of our friends sitting with their animals and getting them ready to show. It is a good way to keep kids off the streets and into the "mucking mood". Any kid that can clean up all that muck and take care of those sometimes obstinate animals, can't go too far astray. My husband, Jack, raised cows and pigs as a youth and young adult and he had the "pig stick" to prove it. It was like a cane but had a certain contour that made it easy to quide a pig around the arena. Jack always loves to go through the hog barn. There is just something about all that grunting and wallowing that must make him happy. Strange quy. You can never take the boy off the farm and I wouldn't want to. Then I go into the cow barn at the fair, the smell of it reminds me of our first year of marriage, when Jack milked cows at the BYU dairy farm. He would roll out of bed at 3 am, put on his heavy green coat and off he would go to earn us more tuition money. When he came home to get ready for classes, I would give him a hug and the big green coat smelled just like the barns at the fair. I must admit the Animal Laboratory where he worked in his career, did smell a little bit different.

Speaking of animals, there are more than just cows, pigs and sheep, at the fair. We love the small animal barn where you can see more varieties of clucking chickens, velvety rabbits, smooth pigeons, cooing doves, and cocky, crowing roosters than anywhere else. All the cacophony of noise, gives you an idea of how Noah must have felt on the ark. The barn is located close to the produce barn. There is no noise from the corn, beans, squash, and fruit. There's just wonderful displays of the best produce in the county. I have a" black thumb" so I love to see that there are still some people harvesting from this grand earth.

As usual, we also made our way through the Home exhibits and were delighted at the canning, cro-

cheting, wood making, drawing, quilting, town exhibits and the other thousands of talents people displayed. Box Elder County must have the most talented people you could ever find anywhere. These exhibits are some of our favorites. We finally found our way back to the 4-H exhibits and marveled at what the young kids in the county were doing. It is hard to believe the talents and exhibits that were displayed. Didn't see one "weed" project though.

As I said before, "There is nothing that makes my heart sing like going to the County Fair." Have you been to any County or State Fairs in your life? Why not write about it? If it's not written it's not history. After all, someday someone might want to hear about your "weed" project.


